- City Budget Presentation, by Jack Pace, Director of the Department of Community Development.
 - See Budget sheet provided
- Chief's update
 - Staffing: Fully Staffed, one new officer just finished field training, two in field training, two about to enter academy. One civilian opening
 - TPD implementing a body camera program. New legislation provides protections from some public disclosure provisions
 - When in use 60% fewer citizen complaints
 - Less L&I claims
 - 5-6 officers are part of the pilot program
 - Increases transparency
 - For a month at a time will use one vendor, then switch vendors (not officers) to assess different systems.
 - Cameras to be on during all citizen contacts.
 - Must advise all people who they contact that the encounter is being recorded.
 - First month's data in for SPRINT program
 - They have written a lot of tickets
 - Getting citizen "thank yous"
 - Goal is to target speeding and slow people down
 - Part of the program is also to engineer traffic calming measures by working with public works.
 - Focus is on the residential neighborhoods and schools
 - Boats and Mobile Command Post were out on the Duwamish River today looking for a homicide weapon which was dumped there

- Yesterday was Cascadia Rising event, with all departments represented down in the Emergency Command Center (EOC) at Fire Station 51.
- Boeing 100 Year Celebration July 15, 16, 17. E Marginal Way will be shut down near the Museum of Flight. They are anticipating 40,000 people per day.

 - Jun TEC Team did Cascadia Rising exercise with a no cell or 800mhz. Used runners, paper, pen and HAM radios.

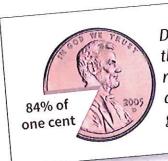

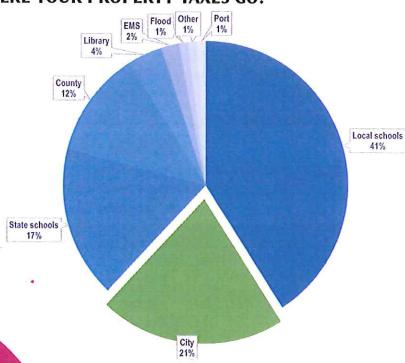

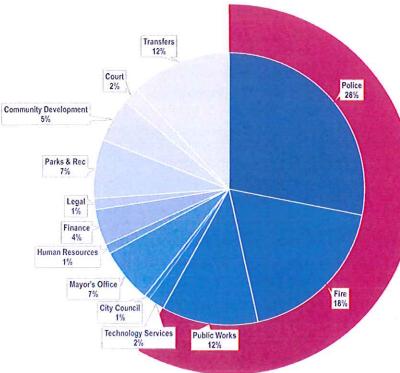

BUDGET FACTS

The City's general fund budget for 2016 is \$59,585,779, or 47% OF THE CITY'S TOTAL REVENUE

MORE THAN 50% OF THE GENERAL FUND GOES TO PUBLIC SAFETY - police, fire and public works

Other funds are restricted in terms of type and how they can be spent and CANNOT BE SPENT ON BASIC CITY SERVICES covered by the general fund

By City policy and in order to meet financial best practice, THE CITY RETAINS CONTINGENCY RESERVES in the event of an emergency or downturn in the economy
