SUBJECT: Resolution to Surplus City Equipment for 2025

ISSUE

Approval is required for the annual Resolution authorizing the sale of surplus equipment no longer needed by the City under the authority granted with RCW 35A.11.010.

ANALYSIS

The Public Works Department fleet manager has identified 30 pieces of equipment that have outlived their service life, are no longer required, or have been replaced by the City. Some of these items still operate but either require extensive repairs, are no longer needed, or are too costly to overhaul.

FISCAL IMPACT

All pieces of equipment are fully depreciated and are currently valued at \$68,225. Selling the equipment at auction in an "as-is" condition is now the most practical solution for disposal. Revenue generated from the surplus process is returned to the fund that originally paid for the purchase of the equipment.

RECOMMENDATION

Council is being asked to approve the Resolution declaring 30 pieces of equipment, estimated value at \$68,225, as surplus and authorize their sale, and to consider this item on the Consent Agenda of the December 1, 2025 Regular Council Meeting.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUKWILA, WASHINGTON, DECLARING CERTAIN FLEET VEHICLES AND EQUIPMENT SURPLUS, AND AUTHORIZING THEIR SALE OR DISPOSAL.

WHEREAS, the City of Tukwila purchased twenty-nine (29) vehicles and one (1) other piece of equipment described and depicted in an inventory list with estimated salvage values and photographs on Exhibits A and B, which were utilized by various City departments; and

WHEREAS, the twenty-nine (29) vehicles and one (1) other piece of equipment described and depicted on Exhibits A and B, have a combined estimated salvage value of \$68,225, and

WHEREAS, the vehicles and other pieces of equipment described and depicted on Exhibits A and B have outlived their usefulness and are no longer needed by the City of Tukwila's Fleet (Equipment Rental) Department or any other City Department; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tukwila has statutory authority to dispose of personal property under RCW 35A.11.010, provided such personal property is declared surplus to the City's needs;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUKWILA, WASHINGTON, HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Declaration of Surplus. The twenty-nine (29) vehicles and one (1) other piece of equipment described and depicted on the attached Exhibits A and B are hereby declared surplus.

Section 2. Fleet Department authorized to sell. The Fleet Department, as part of the City's replacement program, is hereby authorized to sell thirty (30) pieces of equipment described and depicted in the inventory list and photographs on Exhibits A and B, for the best available price, or properly dispose of those remaining items it is unable to sell in any commercially reasonable manner for the common benefit.

King County Flood Control District - 2025 Flood Reduction Grant Award

ISSUE

Accept Flood Control District (FCD) 2025 Flood Reduction grant award for Gilliam Creek Fish Barrier Removal Project in the amount of \$750,000 for design.

BACKGROUND

The Gilliam Creek Fish Barrier Removal and Habitat Enhancement project was established as a City CIP project in 2019 and is a priority project with Water Resource Inventory (WRIA) 9 and the Salmon Recovery Fund Board. This multi-benefit infrastructure project aims to restore fish passage between Gilliam Creek and the Green River, enhance habitat, and maintain or improve flood protection and the operation of the flap gate system.

DISCUSSION

In July staff applied for the 2025 Flood Reduction grant program for the Gilliam Creek project. The City initially applied for \$1,500,000 and was awarded \$750,000. This funding will be used to perform a comprehensive analysis of the Gilliam Creek Southcenter area, focusing on flood modeling, hydraulic assessments, and stakeholder coordination. Funding will also be used to complete a 60% basis of design report which includes a geotechnical investigation, stability analysis of the levee, and updates to the plans and construction cost estimate. This phase picks up on the near-complete 30% design package funded in part by past Flood Reduction grants. The City has contracted with Otak for this work.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City was awarded a \$750,000 grant for the Gilliam Creek Fish Barrier Removal project. This grant has no local City match.

DESCRIPTION:

Construct fish passage improvements at existing flap gate and restore salmonid habitat; replace flap gate which may include a self-regulating tide gate or flood wall.

JUSTIFICATION:

Enable fish access to lower Gilliam Creek under wider range of flow conditions; fish barrier per WDFW and City; WRIA 9 salmon habitat project.

STATUS: Alternatives Analysis Design completed in 2023.

MAINTENANCE IMPACT: M&O is typically 3-5 years for HPA permits to revegetate streambanks following barrier removal.

COMMENT:

City applied to NOAA grants (Fish Passage & Transformational Habitat) in 2023 for design development and construction funding for the preferred alternative (estimated \$24 M). City was not selected for one of the two grants. Meanwhile, the 66th Ave S culvert, tide gate and upstream debris rack (fish barriers) are causing erosion of the streambanks upstream of the 66th Ave S culvert. Permitting agencies may require fish passage as a condition of permits to repair the aforementioned erosion.

SUBJECT: Surface Water Fund – Chinook Wind Extension

Project No. 92341202 - 2025 King County Parks Open Space-River Corridors (OSRC)

ISSUE

Accept a 2025 King County Parks Open Space-River Corridors (OSRC) Grant for \$1,000,000 to fund the construction of the Chinook Wind Extension project.

BACKGROUND

In April 2025, staff applied to the King County Parks OSRC grant program to fund the construction of the Chinook Wind Extension project. The OSRC grant program supports projects that improve the natural function of rivers, public access, and/or awareness of river corridors as valuable natural resources.

DISCUSSION

In July 2025, staff were notified of a \$1,000,000 award. This project seeks to complete the "missing link" public access trail between the recently completed Chinook Wind Mitigation Site and Duwamish Gardens. This project will also create complimentary off-channel habitat that will be utilized by juvenile Chinook, contributing to species recovery efforts.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City will receive \$1,000,000 from the OSRC program. No local match is required. The City also was awarded a \$618,324 grant from the King County Flood Control District Cooperative Watershed Management program to supplement this OSRC funding for Construction and Construction Management. The total cost for the Chinook Wind Extension project has increased in part because the project was separated from the larger Public Works Shops Phase 2 project. This separation requires additional coordination with King County and other stakeholders, resulting in more staff and consultant time during the design phase before the project can advance to construction.

DESCRIPTION:

Following the Public Works Facility Preferred Master Plan (2019) and the Duwamish Gardens Opportunities for Expansion Concept Plan (2013), this project will develop connecting shoreline habitat and the 'missing trail link' between Duwamish Gardens and Chinook Wind within recently acquired City property.

JUSTIFICATION:

This is a Tier 1 project in the WRIA 9 Salmon Recovery Plan, fulfilling a core recovery strategy of restoring, protecting and enhancing estuary habitat in the Duwamish River. The trail connection has been discussed in the community for many years and is anticipated to be part of larger, popular shoreline trail.

STATUS: The project is currently at 50% design.


MAINTENANCE IMPACT:

This is a work in progress. The Green Infrastructure Program Proposal is intended, in part, to address maintenance needs for PW-initiated habitat restoration projects and helping to alleviate pressure on Parks' given resource constraints. Note that vegetation management maintenance needs decrease over time as planted vegetation matures. 3 years is considered a rule of thumb for plant establishment.

COMMENT:

This grant funded project is being implemented as part of the PW Shops Ph 2 project. There are expectations by the granting agency that the project will be constructed. It is the middle link of the Duwamish Gardens/Chinook Wind trail and "blue belt" aquatic restoration corridor.

SUBJECT: West Valley Highway (SR 181) Ordinance

ISSUE

Approve the West Valley Highway (SR 181) Ordinance amending Tukwila Municipal Code Chapter 9.16 "Local Speed Limits"

BACKGROUND

The boundary between City of Kent and the City of Tukwila along the West Valley Highway (SR 181) corridor is located on the center line of the highway. From S 180th St to the Union Pacific Railroad crossing, the southbound direction of SR 181 is within the City of Tukwila, and the northbound direction is within the City of Kent. The attached map provides a visual of the boundary.

Representatives from the City of Kent reached out to Tukwila staff with an inquiry about whether Tukwila would consider lowering the speed limit on the City's section of West Valley Highway in coordination with Kent's revision. The City of Kent had recently received approval from WSDOT to reduce the speed limit on West Valley Highway from 50 mph to 40 mph after the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) conducted a speed study, inclusive of the Tukwila section. As West Valley Highway is a state highway, WSDOT must approve all speed limits. City of Kent expects to adopt the speed limit reduction to 40 mph from S 180th Street southward on December 2, 2025. Kent forces are anticipated to change out speed limit signs sometime in January 2026.

DISCUSSION

City personnel are working in parallel with staff from the City of Kent to have the speed limit reduced on SR 181. The coordination efforts and adoption of the ordinance amendment will ensure that both the City of Kent and the City of Tukwila will post signage simultaneously, reducing confusion for both drivers and law enforcement.

This ordinance enables the Tukwila Police Department, Kent Police Department, and Washington State Patrol to enforce penalties against drivers who fail to comply with the posted regulatory speed limit.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUKWILA, WASHINGTON, REPEALING VARIOUS ORDINANCES AS CODIFIED AT TUKWILA MUNICIPAL CODE (TMC) CHAPTER 9.16, "LOCAL SPEED LIMITS – ONE-WAY STREETS"; REENACTING TMC CHAPTER 9.16; ADOPTING UPDATED REASONABLE AND SAFE MAXIMUM SPEED LIMITS ON CERTAIN DESIGNATED STREETS, AS POSTED BY OFFICIAL TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, chapter 9.16 of the Tukwila Municipal Code ("TMC") adopts by reference the Washington Model Traffic Ordinance set forth in chapter 308-330 of the Washington Administrative Code ("WAC"); and

WHEREAS, the Washington Model Traffic Ordinance and RCW 46.61.415 set forth the procedure for local authorities to determine and declare the maximum speed limits on city arterials, streets, and other rights-of-way, based on an engineering and traffic investigation by the traffic engineer. Following an engineering study or traffic investigation, the City of Tukwila ("City") may establish limits on certain designated streets by resolution; and

WHEREAS, previously, Resolution No. 1370 established the maximum speed limit on certain portions of West Valley Highway (SR 181); and

WHEREAS, the City shares jurisdictional authority on West Valley Highway with the City of Kent from the southern City limits north to South 180th Street. The City of Kent controls speed limits for northbound traffic, and the City of Tukwila controls speed limits for southbound traffic, both requiring consultation with the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) on state routes; and

WHEREAS, the City of Kent is lowering the maximum speed limit for northbound traffic on that portion of the shared West Valley Highway after an engineering study and traffic investigation, and with approval from WSDOT, the Kent City Council is reducing the speed limit from 50 mph to 40 mph; and

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WHEREAS, the City desires to have the same maximum speed limit for southbound traffic on the shared portion of West Valley Highway with the City of Kent, and approval for the new maximum speed limit was granted by WSDOT based on the engineering study prepared by the City of Kent; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes the need for updating and amending the code provisions under Title 9 of the Tukwila Municipal Code to enact the maximum speed limit change;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUKWILA, WASHINGTON, HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Adoption of Findings of Fact. The City Council finds as follows.

The above recitals, set forth as "WHEREAS" clauses, are hereby adopted as Findings of Fact in support of the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 2. Repealer. Ordinance Nos. 1370 §1 (part), 1395 §1 & §2, 1583 §1, 1866 § 1, 1875 §1, 2380 §1, and 2566 §2, as codified at TMC Chapter 9.16, "Local Speed Limits – One-Way Streets," are hereby repealed, thereby eliminating this chapter.

A 40 mile-per-hour speed limit zone is established on the West Valley Highway (SR 181) from the southern limits of the City of Tukwila at approximately State Highway Milepost No. 9.24 northward to the end of the State Highway and the beginning of Interurban Avenue at approximately State Highway Milepost No. 11.45.

Section 5. TMC Section 9.16.020 is hereby reenacted to read as follows:

42nd Avenue South from Interurban Avenue to the north terminus of the 42nd Avenue S Bridge is restricted to a maximum speed of 15 mile-per-hour for all Type 1, Type 2, and Type 3 trucks, as defined by the American Association of State Highway Officials (AASHTO).

The speed limit signs are to be posted at the same time between both jurisdictions to avoid driver confusion.

Section 12. Corrections by City Clerk or Code Reviser Authorized. Upon approval of the City Attorney, the City Clerk and the code reviser are authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including the correction of clerical errors; references to other local, state or federal laws, codes, rules, or regulations; or ordinance numbering and section/subsection numbering.

Section 13. Severability. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance or its application to any person or situation should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this ordinance or its application to any other person or situation.

Section 14. Effective Date. This ordinance or a summary thereof shall be published in the official newspaper of the City, and shall take effect and be in full force five days after passage and publication as provided by law, provided that the speed limits set forth in this ordinance shall not be enforceable until appropriate signs are posted.
